NEW STUDENT PROGRESS

Of the first-time, full-time, degree- or certificate-seeking students who enrolled in fall 2022, 20.5% have graduated from CCV, 3.7% transferred to another institution, and 5% were still enrolled in fall 2025. This group of students represented 2.8% of CCV's total fall 2022 enrollment; 84% of these students received some form of financial aid: 51% received a Pell Grant, 8% had a subsidized Stafford Loan and no Pell Grant, and 41% had neither. Within this first-time, full-time graduating cohort of students, 39.4% were male, 60.6% female, and 12.1% identified as a member of a minority racial or ethnic group.
